IAS Members Visit LAS Dark Site

IAS members Terry Steadham, Jay Simmons and John Molt visited the Louisville Astronomical Society's recently acquired observing site in southern Indiana. Located east of Patoka Lake near Curby IN. The skies are good, perhaps 6.5 magnitude viewing with only a few light issues.

The terrain is moderately rolling boarded by corn field and woods with plenty of room to accommodate observers - those that would like to camp are asked to setup near the north perimeter woods.

Club members have done an outstanding job constructing a roll-off roof observatory which houses a 16" Meade Newtonian, 12" Meade LX200 Schmidt-Cassegrain and a 178mm Meade refractor, all donated by local folks. Adjoining the observatory is a well-equipped electronics room. An extremely nice feature of the observing floor is thick rubber matting - very comfortable to walk on not to mention for the occasional dropped eyepiece.

They are in the final stages of converting a trailer that will be used for a warm room, small group meetings, refreshments and a restroom.

Observer's Corner

Bill Conner received a note from Joe Goss who is one of our past presidents. Joe now lives in Arizona. It particularly struck me as I had set up my portable observatory to get a little observing at the house and find that I have now sat for eight straight days with out one second of observing! Weather is not predicted to change for another four days. Indiana Sucks with regard to observing!! Note from Joe: The weather in Indiana was the main reason I moved to Arizona. If you plan 5 star parties in Indiana, you might get lucky and have a clear sky for one of them. If you plan 5 star parties in Arizona, you might get unlucky and have clouds for one of them. I hated to leave the Link Observatory and the IAS, but I could not do the visual observing in Indiana that I wanted. I have used an LX-200 10" for the last 7 years to observe the Herschel 400, 110 Messier objects in one night, and observed 462 galaxies in Virgo. In March, of this year I bought a Celestron CGE 14". In June, I saw a 15.5 mag galaxy in Virgo with this telescope. With this new telescope I have set a goal to see 700 galaxies in Virgo.

There was a really good article in the latest Astronomy Magazine. It highlights the objects of the Winter sky. Starting with the constellation Auriga, one can find three great open clusters, M-36, 37, and 38. These are easily detectable at low power or in binoculars. Higher power brings out the red giants imbedded in the clusters. If one wanders South to Taurus, you can find the v-shaped cluster the Haedes. As you observe Taurus, look for the splatter of the Crab(M-1). It is had to see in Indiana. Look for then naked eye visible Plaedes cluster in Taurus. This is one of the most beautiful clusters in the sky. Again a low power object. Move on the Gemini and look at Castor and (Pollux. Castor is a great double (actually it is an astounding sextuplet system) At the feet of Gemini ones finds the great open cluster M-35. Thennnnn we move on to the fantastic constellation Orion. You could spend your life looking at this area of the sky. It has great stars, nebulae, dark nebulae. Look for a small group of stars NGC1981. South of this one finds the little gas cloud, The Running Man Nebula. South of this one runs smack into M-42 the great Orion Nebula. I still get goose bumps when I observe it. See how much you can split the Trapezium. How many stars can you see? Move on to Monocerous and see if you can see the cluster of the Rosette Nebula. You won't be able to see the nebula but the cluster is obvious. Move on to Serius and go 5° south to the open cluster M-41. It is very nice. M-46 and M-47 in Puppis are both excellent clusters.

Look at the article in Astronomy and get out the atlas. I guarantee you will have fun.


List Server Online - Don't be left in the cold - Sign up!
