The Apollo Program John A. Beetham

John will speak on the background of the Apollo program, key individuals that made it happen, guidance to the Moon and back to Earth, technology and man related reliability, and a few stories.

Our speaker this month is John A. Beetham. Mr. Beetham was Director of Product Support for Allison Gas Turbine Division of General Motors, one of 13 Directors reporting to the General Manager. He directed more than 400 people who supported Allison products worldwide.

Born May 21, 1930, in Boscobel, Wisconsin, he graduated from Fennimore High School in 1948, and from St. Louis University in 1952, with a Bachelor of Science Degree in Aero Engineering.

Mr. Beetham served as an officer in the United States Air Force Tactical Air Command (TAC) as an armament systems and radar fire control officer.

In 1964, he was appointed Reliability Program Manager for the Apollo guidance and navigation systems for the command and service module and the lunar landing vehicle. In this function, he was responsible for design reliability, product quality, subcontractor reliability, field support, and system flight readiness reliability until 1970, when Apollo production ended.

Mr. Beetham retired from General Motors in 1990 and now is active in the Experimental Aircraft Assoc., and the American Helicopter Society among other interests.

Observer's Corner

This month we have an opportunity to see Mercury as it sojourns across the face of the sun. The transit starts at approximately 2:12 PM EST on November 8. It will take approximately 5 hours for the transit to complete. This is a telescope event and **MAKE SURE YOU HAVE PROPER FILTERING SYSTEMS**. Looking at the Sun can be dangerous. The next such event will be in 2016 so get out and try to see this one. I have seen one before and it is an exciting site.

The second opportunity we have this month is the Leonids meteor shower on the night of November 18/Morning of November 19. We have a waning crescent Moon so it will not be a problem. Predictions are for a good shower though not a storm. Look to the East around Midnight

Board Meeting – November 16, 2006 - 7:00 PM


