James Woods Lectures in the Science and Mathematics Series at Butler University

Jill Tarter to Speak as Woods Lecturer Oct. 15 at 7:30 p.m. in the Atherton Union Reilly Room

Jill Tarter, physicist and director of the SETI (Search for Extraterrestrial Intelligence) Institute, will speak as part of the 2003_04 J. James Woods Lectures in the Sciences and Mathematics Series on Wednesday, Oct. 15 at 7:30 p.m. in the Atherton Union Reilly Room. Dr. Tarter will discuss SETI: Science Fact, Not Fiction. The event is free and open to the public.

Dr. Tarter holds the Bernard M. Oliver Chair for SETI and is director of the Center for SETI Research at the SETI Institute in Mountain View, Calif. She received her bachelor of engineering physics degree from Cornell University and her masters degree and a Ph.D. in astronomy from the University of California, Berkeley. Tarter served as project scientist for NASA's SETI program and has conducted numerous observational programs at radio observatories nationwide.

Dr. Tarter has published scores of technical articles, has been elected to many professional societies and has served on a number of scientific advisory committees. Her work has brought her wide recognition in the scientific community, including the Lifetime Achievement Award from Women in Aerospace and two Public Service Medals from NASA.

Dr. Tarter is deeply involved in the education of future citizens and scientists. In addition to her scientific leadership at NASA and SETI Institute, Dr. Tarter is the principal investigator for two curriculum development projects. The first, the "Life in the Universe" series, created six science teaching guides for grades three through nine. Her second project, "Voyages through Time" is an integrated high school science curriculum on the fundamental theme of

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evolution. Dr. Tarter is a frequent speaker for science teacher meetings and at museums and science centers, bringing her commitment to science and education to both teachers and the public.


October Board Meeting – October 16 - 7:00 PM



The Link Observatory is located 5 1/4 miles south of the S.R. 67 & S.R. 144 interchange in Mooresville. A diamond shape hi-way transportation sign will warn you of the approaching Observatory Road intersection. Turn right (west) up the steep hill and continue 1.3 miles to the observatory, where there is a one-lane drive on your right named: Observatory Lane. The driveway to the observatory is immediately to your right when you make your turn onto the lane. It's easy to miss; watch your odometer.
